
DEVELOPING WATER PROJECTS & FUNDING PARTNERSHIPS

It Takes Cooperation & Multiple Funding Sources

For many decades, the State of North Dakota has remained committed to working with local water project sponsors to develop critical flood protection, water supply, and other general water management projects across the state. Water projects improve North Dakota's resiliency to flooding and drought, they support economic development, and provide safe and reliable water supplies for our citizens. But in order to advance water projects, it takes a great deal of financial investment – from a broad spectrum of sources.

Dollars At Work - Where Do They Come From?

STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA	LOCAL SPONSORS	OTHER
Most state funding contributions to water projects are through the Department of Water Resources' (DWR) Cost-Share Program (CSP). The CSP provides matching funds of 40% to 80% - depending on project type. State funding provided through DWR primarily comes from the state's Resources Trust Fund (RTF). The RTF is funded with 20.5 percent of revenues from North Dakota's oil extraction tax. In addition, the passage of HB 1431 in 2021 allowed for state bond proceeds for water projects totaling \$510 million.	The primary sources of local dollars that match state cost-share funds include property taxes, assessments, local sales taxes, and water use fees.	Water project costs are sometimes also offset by various types of federal grants/funding, and in limited cases, private investment.
	20%-60% of DWR-eligible water project costs are the responsibility of local project sponsors. Percentages are also applicable to the non-federal share.
